A WORD FROM THE FIRE CHIEF



Adapting well in the face of adversity, trauma, tragedy, threats, or significant sources of stress. That is what it means to be resilient, and that is what we have seen from our staff and our community throughout 2020. This has been a year of change and challenges for all of us, and the San Carlos Park Fire Protection & Rescue Service District is no different.

Thank you for taking a moment to look back at 2020 with us and as you do, you may notice our Annual Report looks a little different than it has in years past. This year we've chosen to focus the bulk of our imagery not on the incidents that occurred but on those who responded to those incidents. Why? Because tough times don't last, tough people do. In our eyes the common thread throughout this past year has been the resilience of our organization and those we serve and we're proud to highlight those tough individuals and crews here.

Much like years past, this has been a busy year for our district with response to 4,071 calls. As an all-hazards agency these emergencies included fires, medical emergencies, natural and man-made events, hazardous materials incidents, technical rescues, brush fires and many other types of incidents. Medical calls, which make up more than 50% of our responses, required a new approach to protect our staff and our patients. As the nation raced to purchase personal protective equipment, I'm in awe of how our staff adapted to the shortages of PPE and put their lives on the line time and again to serve the needs of the community.

Although COVID-19 limited our face to face interaction with you, we did our best to find new ways to stay involved with our community through virtual events. In 2020, 127 needy children had gifts to open on Christmas morning thanks to the Annual Secret Santa Program, 88 children received a letter from Santa himself through the Santa Mailbox Program, 4 winners were crowned in the 1st Annual SCPFD Pumpkin Carving Contest and countless birthdays were celebrated through drive-by parades.

I would like to thank the Board of Fire Commissioners for their guidance, governance, and support in these uncertain and difficult times. I would also like to say thank you to our staff for their continued dedication to service and ability to find ways to touch our community (from at least 6 feet away). The changes and challenges are ongoing. We hope you will continue to work with us as we adapt our organization to meet the moment. Stay safe, stay strong, and stay resilient.





TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET



SCPFD participates in a cooperative agreement for "Closest Unit Response" with Bonita Springs Fire Control and Rescue District. Estero Fire Rescue. South Trail Fire and Rescue and Iona McGregor Fire District. This agreement ensures the closest Advanced Life Support Unit and/or fire apparatus will respond to your emergency regardless of jurisdictional boundaries. Automatic Closest Unit Response not only ensures you will receive the fastest possible emergency response in your time of need, it also allows San Carlos Park Fire District to provide you with a high caliber of service in the most costeffective way possible. Through cooperative agreements such as this, multiple agencies and the citizens they serve, all benefit.

SCPFD Firefighters are also dual certified as either Paramedics or EMTs, though the majority of our personnel have obtained their Paramedic Credentials. Additionally, each of our fire apparatus are fully equipped with Advanced Life Support.



RESILIENCE



OPERATIONS

The District provides the community with an all-hazard response system utilizing highly trained and skilled employees. We deliver this response utilizing 19 responders each day, working a 24-hour shift. We have 3 shifts A, B, and C. Each shift is managed by a Battalion Chief. Operations is responsible for response to all E911 calls, district staffing, and facility and vehicle maintenance. Operations provides oversight and support to district training, emergency medical services, and fire prevention. In 2020 the district responded to 4,071 incidents.


4,071 INCIDENTS IN 2020

INCIDENTS BY SHIFT






TRAINING


On average each SCPFD firefighter spends 18 hours a month training. Training consists of both classroom based and practical skills. Examples of training include: self contained breathing apparatus, ropes, extrication, water rescue, pre-fire planning, driving operation, water supply, aerial apparatus operation, leadership, tactics and strategy, human relations and management, and public relations.

In addition to occupational skill based training, SCPFD firefighters also participate in regular physical training to remain in optimal physical condition to perform the duties ensuring the highest quality of service possible to our residents.



In addition to caring for human health emergencies, SCPFD also carries pet oxygen masks on our engines to administer oxygen to your pet in the event of their rescue from a home fire.






