## David Cambareri FIRE CHIEF

Thank you for taking a moment to read through the San Carlos Park Fire Protection & Rescue Service District's 2025 Annual Report. We are excited to share with you 2025's most memorable moments. We have done our best to provide you with the exemplary level of service you've come to expect before, during, and after your emergencies over the past year and are proud to serve this great community.

This has been a busy year for our fire district with response to 5,604 calls for service. As an all-hazards agency these emergencies included fire, medical emergencies, motor vehicle crashes, natural and man-made events, hazardous materials incidents, technical rescues, brush fires and many other types of incidents.

As always charitable giving and community involvement were a big part of the year. In 2025, we attended countless community events including WGPU's Be My Neighbor Day, GCTC's Power Up for School, and the Make a Wish Walk for Wishes. Due to the dedication of our staff, 157 children in need had gifts to open on Christmas morning thanks to the Annual Secret Santa Program, 118 children received a letter from Santa himself through the Santa Mailbox Program, 33,592 people received community risk reduction (CRR) education and multiple charities benefited from funds raised by Dinners at the Firehouse.

Our Fire District also experienced growth in 2025 with the opening of Station 55 off Three Oaks Pkwy., and the onboarding of 12 Probationary Firefighters.

I would like to thank the Board of Fire Commissioners for their continued guidance, governance, and support which enabled us to offer the exemplary level of service we provide to our community. Thank you to our staff for their continued dedication to service. And finally, on behalf of our staff and Fire Commissioners thank you for the privilege to serve.

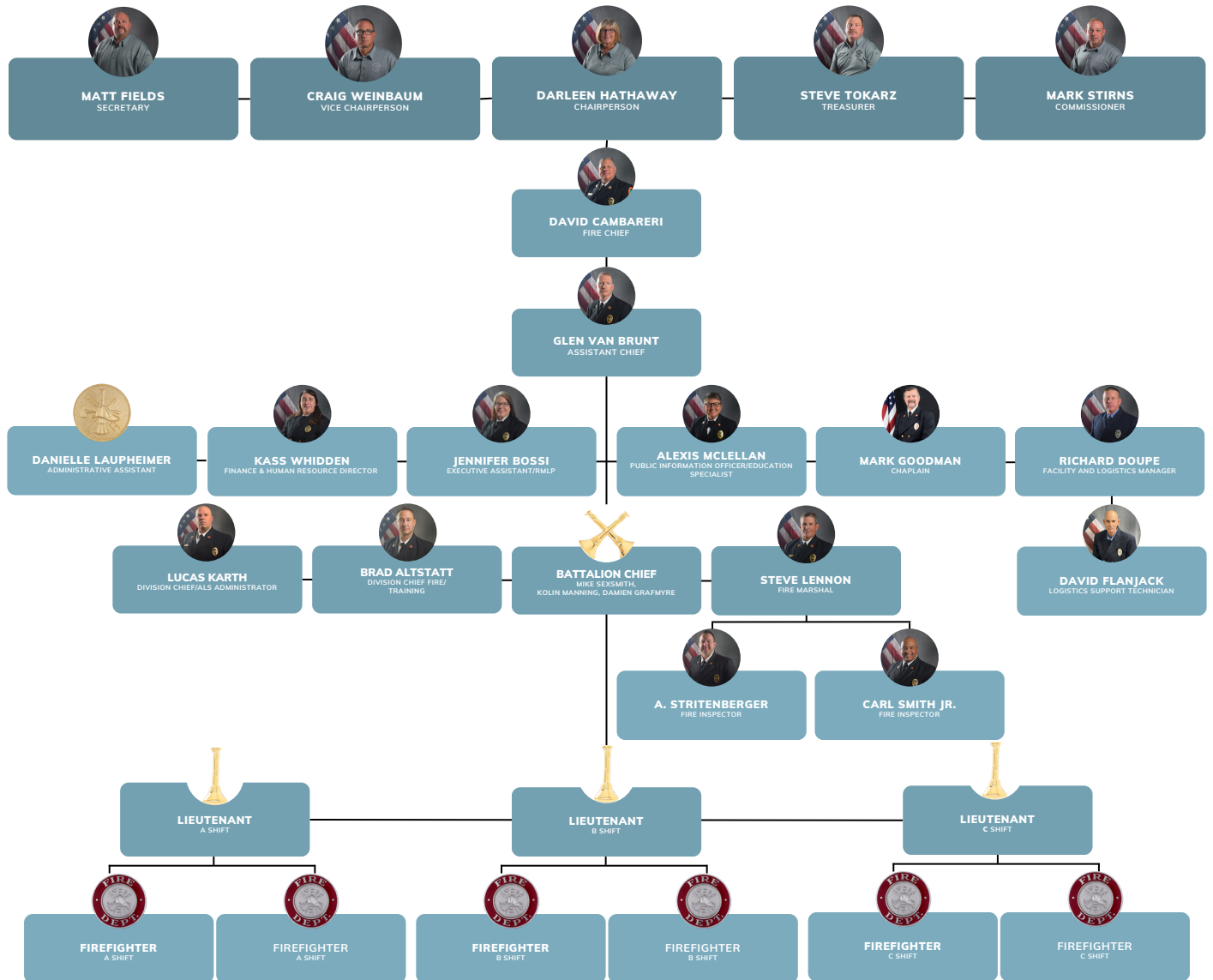

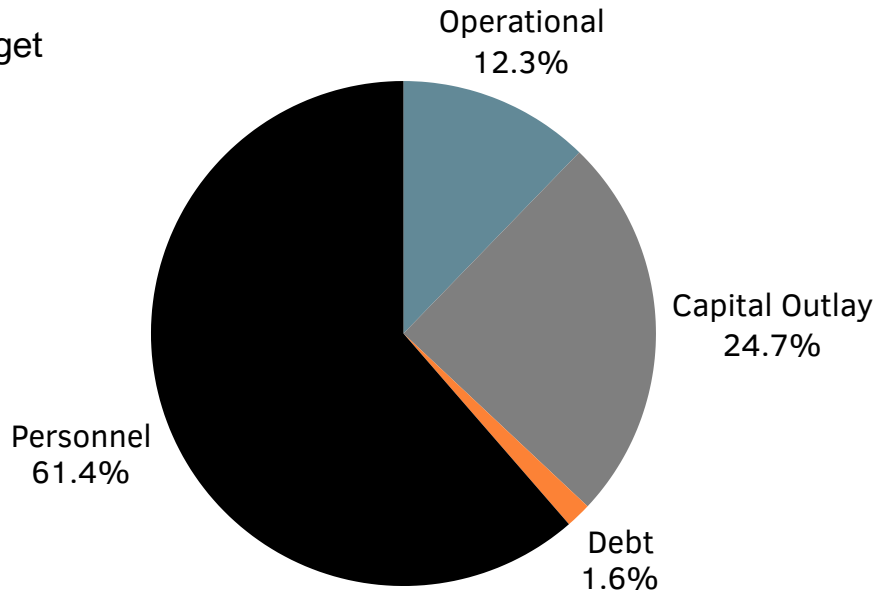

## 5,601 Calls for Service in 2025

The District provides the community with an all-hazard response system utilizing highly trained and skilled employees. We deliver this response utilizing 20-22 responders each day, working a 24-hour shift. We have 3 shifts A, B, and C. Each shift is managed by a Battalion Chief. Operations is responsible for response to all 911 calls, district staffing, and facility and vehicle maintenance. Operations provides oversight and support to district training, emergency medical services, and fire prevention. In 2025 the district responded to 5,601 calls for service.

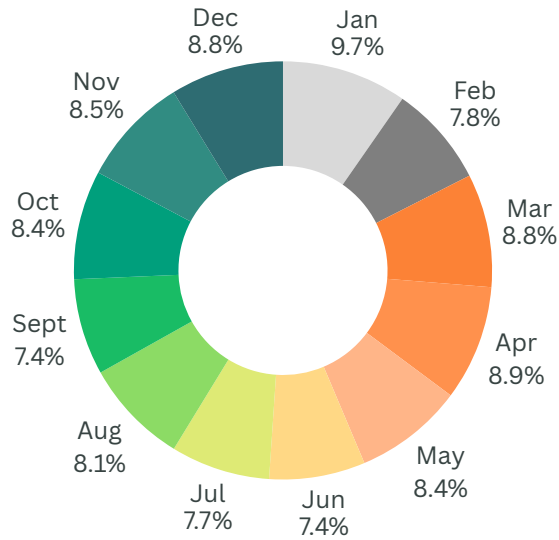
### Calls for Service by Station

## Calls for Service by Month





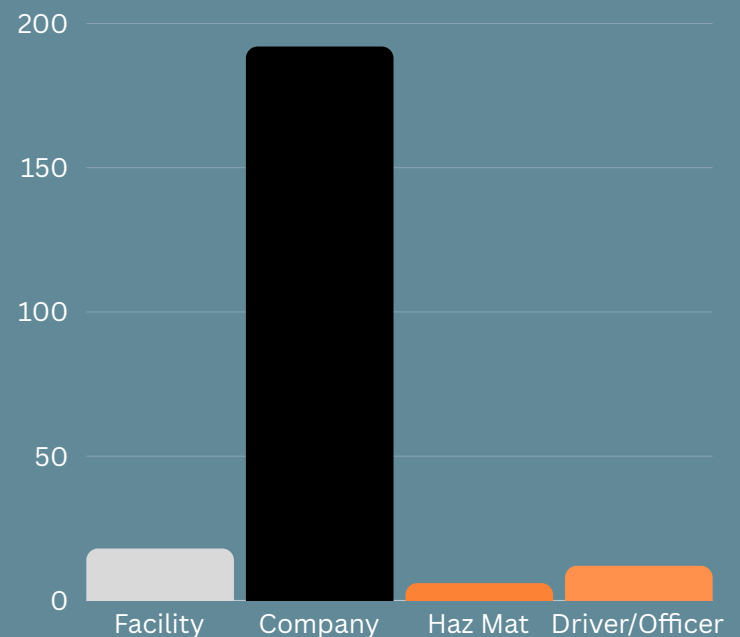
# TRAINING



## → SCFPD held 14,163 training events in 2025

Firefighter training includes: self contained breathing apparatus, ropes, extrication, water rescue, pre-fire planning, driving operation, water supply, aerial apparatus operation, leadership, tactics and strategy, human relations and management, and public relations. In addition to occupational skill based training, SCFPD firefighters also participate in regular physical training to remain in optimal physical condition to perform the duties ensuring the highest quality of service possible to our residents.

## EMS



In addition to fire suppression, San Carlos Park Fire District also provides emergency medical services. All of our firefighters are trained as EMTs, and many are trained Paramedics. By staffing a Paramedic on each apparatus, we are able to provide Advanced Life Support (ALS) services from all of our fire engines and rescue trucks. Advanced Life Support (ALS) is a set of life-saving protocols and skills that extend beyond basic life support such as cardiac monitoring, intubation, and administering IV medications. All of our fire engines carry the same ALS equipment that ambulances do. So, while an engine cannot transport a patient to the hospital, the crew can begin emergency medical services to save a life.

Our engines are sometimes closer to medical emergencies and can arrive on the scene faster than ambulances. Also, because medical emergencies sometimes occur in hazardous environments such as on a busy road or at the scene of a crime, a two-unit response provides for greater level safety of patients, fire department personnel, and bystanders.

So the next time you see a fire engine on the scene of a medical call, rest assured you are witnessing the responsible use of District resources to provide the highest level of care in the shortest amount of time to all patients in San Carlos Park Fire District.
