Thank you for taking a moment to read through San Carlos Park Fire Protection & Rescue Service District's 2023 Annual Report. We are excited to share with you 2023's memorable moments. We have done our best to provide you with the exemplary level of service you've come to expect before, during, and after your emergencies over the past year.

This has been a busy year for our fire district with response to 5,668 calls for service. As an all-hazards agency these emergencies included fire, medical emergencies, motor vehicle crashes, natural and manmade events, hazardous materials incidents, technical rescues, brush fires and many other types of incidents.

As always charitable giving and community involvement were a big part of the year. In 2023, 144 children in need had gifts to open on Christmas morning thanks to the Annual Secret Santa Program, 170 children received a letter from Santa himself through the Santa Mailbox Program, 2 charities benefited from funds raised by Dinners at the Firehouse, 13 animals were rescued, and over 30,000 people received fire and life safety education.

I would like to thank the Board of Fire Commissioners for their continued guidance, governance, and support which









5,668 Calls for Service

The District provides the community with an all-hazard response system utilizing highly trained and skilled employees. We deliver this response utilizing 19 responders each day, working a 24-hour shift. We have 3 shifts A, B, and C. Each shift is managed by a Battalion Chief. Operations is responsible for response to all 911 calls, district staffing, and facility and vehicle maintenance. Operations provides oversight and support to district training, emergency medical services, and fire prevention. In 2023 the district responded to 5,668 calls for service.

Incidents by Shift






Incidents by Station














Training

On average a SCPFD Firefighter spends 18 hours training per month

Firefighter training includes: self contained breathing apparatus, ropes, extrication, water rescue, pre-fire planning, driving operation, water supply, aerial apparatus operation, leadership, tactics and strategy, human relations and management, and public relations. In addition to occupational skill based training, SCPFD firefighters also participate in regular physical training to remain in optimal physical condition to perform the duties ensuring the highest quality of service possible to our residents.



Training by Type






EMS

In addition to fire suppression, San Carlos Park Fire District also provides emergency medical services. All of our firefighters are trained as EMTs, and many are trained Paramedics. By staffing a Paramedic on each apparatus, we are able to provide Advanced Life Support (ALS) services from all of our fire engines and rescue trucks. Advanced Life Support (ALS) is a set of life-saving protocols and skills that extend basic life support such as cardiac monitoring, intubation, and administering IV medications. All of our fire engines carry the same ALS equipment that ambulances do. So, while an engine cannot transport a patient to the hospital, the crew can begin emergency medical services to save a life.

Our engines are sometimes closer to medical emergencies and can arrive on the scene faster than ambulances. Also, because medical emergencies sometimes occur in hazardous environments such as on a busy road or at the scene of a crime, a two-unit response provides for greater level safety of patients, fire department personnel, and bystanders.




